Most people didn't wear them when the photo above was taken, but they have been compulsory for a long time noiw.


I recently came across an article about approval codes so I thought you may be interested to know for when you buy you're your next mutt.

The legislation is controlled by the United Nations Economic commission (UNEC and has 16 main members such as Canada, Israel, UK, USA, EEC etc., etc.

Did you know that from 2020 all helemts are supposed to comply with:

Recently I was looking for a period style open face helmet to go with my New Hudson Autocycle and was concerned to find that if I followed expanded the adverts fully then quite a lot of helmets don't comply with this legislation. This means of course that your insurances may be invalid if you hurt yourself in a tumble. Worse still some insurance companies may invalidate to avoid avoid paying third parties, so you could be sued for any third party damage or injury.

I nearly fell into this trap as I was really fancied a replica pudding basin. The daft thing is my 1964 pudding basin is still legal, if I wished to risk it. I have sketched below what the approval tag looks like so you can check for yourselves

Mad Megola racer found

A recent barn find, this rotary five-cylinder curiosity, was a 1920s German championship-winning machine

IT WAS THE sound that first heralded one of the most bizarre days in motorcycle racing. A deep drone vibrated through the air, giving the impression of a lowflying World War I bomber on the as remarkable as the Megola. Its five-cylinder engine was mounted inside the front wheel. There was no clutch or gearbox and only the rear wheel had a braking system. Pioneering German designer Fritz



How about this lovely machine for early innovation, no clutch, no gearbox, rear wheel brakes only. Engine is 640cc side valve rotarysimilary to a French Gnome aeroplane engine. It would rev up to 3000rpm.

In 1924 'Toni' Bauhofer lapped the AVUS German circuit at 87mph. Bauhofer went on to win over 20 races and took the 1924 German road race championship for the 1000cc class.

The factory also made a touring version and around 2000 were made. Now one of those would be a great restoration project for me.

Can you figure out hoiw they got sparks & fuel to the engine when the whole thing rotated around the from axle, must have had some good sliding electrical connectors and gas seals.
