DSA Under Fire for Test Centre 'Cock-up'. (from MCN 24/3/10) The Commons Transport Committee has looked into the controversy surrounding the new Test Centres and has reported that they are a waste of millions of pounds of taxpayers money. Smaller, old-style test centres should have been kept open instead of building new Multi-purpose Test centres. The new centres can be many daunting miles for learner motorcyclists to travel to and expose inexperienced riders to volumes of high-speed to which they are most likely unaccustomed. Furthermore, exercises not required under the original Brussels directive have been added, some to be performed at speeds not permitted on the public highway in built-up areas. Some 40 MPs have signed a motion for several proposals from MCN, BMF, MAG and others to be debated in the House of Commons. (I'm sure MCN won't let this one drop. 

# Wednesday 16th Sept Panama - 366 miles. Max Altitude - 11,000ft

The good roads led us to the capital San Jose and its 3-lane ring-road where we were well and truly caught up in the lunchtime traffic jam. We stayed in line for a time but the bikes and us were getting hotter. Max was the first to follow the local riders lead and start weaving between the lines of traffic then we were all at it! Low speed maneuvering is an interesting proposition at anytime even more so on a fully laden BMW. The drivers were reasonably sympathetic and shuffled over to make room. It seemed like hours but we soon cleared the main jam and decided to stop at a MacDonalds for a pit-stop and skype. Turned out to be a



bit of an eye-opener. The staff were all slim, not a pimple in sight and the place was clean and smelled fresh. There can't be many acne-free MacDonalds in the world. We were soon back on the road and heading for the mountains. It doesn't look much on the map but the climb and the views were spectacular. The temperature contrast was noticeable, from 37+ deg C on the ring-road we soon hit single figures and rain. We eventually stopped for fuel and a dry and were told to take the coast road, anything to get away from the rain! Well not quite, it did clear for a while but then came down in epic portions! But at least on the coast it was warmer! It got so wet that my diary entries for the 13th - 16th were washed out. It should be mentioned that most vehicles in central America have worn tyres which must make for an interesting drive when it rains. We saw a number of examples of vehicles in fields and one recent head-on impact that anybody would have been fortunate to survive. We crossed into Panama and had to ride another 30 miles in the rain and dark before we reach David.

We were rewarded with a very up market hotel and friendly staff who disappeared off with our wet riding gear and returned them a couple of hours later all washed and dried.

#### Thursday 17th Sept. Panama City 270 Miles.

Another early start for the push to Panama City and a day without border crossings. We rode through mile after mile of banana plantations in the early morning rain. The rain cleared and we were soon opening jacket vents. We rode into the mountains surrounding Panama City and crossed the canal over an impressive bridge. Andy had pre-arranged servicing at the one and only BMW bike service centre in Central America so

we rode straight to the shop. We made some essential running repairs as we waited for the bikes to be serviced. We had asked them weeks ago to get tyres for us, they hadn't and didn't carry any stock! But a call around the local distributors saw 3 sets of Maxxis road tyres delivered within an hour or two - panic over! We spent most of the afternoon at the workshop and were impressed by the mechanic and staff who were all friendly. On arriving at the hotel we were told by the receptionist that she had let Andy and my rooms go! This despite the fact that Jacqui, who had flown down from Acapulco to meet us was in the hotel and had confirmed we would arrive later that day. After the friendly efficiency of the BM Garage,



the off-hand treatment we received from the receptionist was a disappointment. Andy was incandescent, even Jacqui was lost for words! We managed to find a hotel with a vacant room just up the road. It meant sharing, but what the hell, Andy's coughing and my alleged snoring would cancel out each other and I always win the sleep race. All was forgotten after a few beers and good meal at a local Peruvian theme restaurant.

## Friday 18th Sept. Bogotá.

It's not possible to cross from Panama to Columbia by road, there is a section of just about impenetrable jungle and serious bandit country called the Darian Gap that frightened off even the Pan-American highway builders. The quickest option is flying from Panama City to Bogotá. We found the freight forwarders office. It was next door to Max and Jacqui's hotel, paid the fee in cash, the preferred method in Central America and rode the bikes to the airport to the freight packagers. An interesting office complete with 50's style typewriters, a spotty youth playing games on his pc and young lady social networking on her pc. Obviously ran-off their feet. We gave clear instructions on how to strap the bikes to the pallets, on centre-stands and where to tie-down at the back and front. We then were taken to the passenger terminal and checked-in for our flights and went for a beer! We were met in Bogotá by Mr. Bean, the hotel pickup taxi driver and taken to a good quality hotel where we sampled the local cervesa and polished off the bottle of Rum Andy had brought at the duty free, before having some dinner and heading off for a not so early night.

#### Saturday 19th Sept. Bogotá

Off to the freight handlers early to make sure we got the bikes before everything closed down at lunchtime for the weekend. To say it was a close run thing would be an understatement, we were riding the bikes out of the warehouse at 5 minutes to 12 after a series of minor delays and petty officialdom that even made the Panama City forwarders look industrious. But it mattered not one jot as we had the bikes. The fact that they had parked the bikes on the side-stands and lashed them down with two straps, one tied-off at the exhaust pipe didn't matter, we had them back in one piece and nothing broken or missing. Dian are the just about as far removed from James Cargo as is possible.

Our hotel, Los Andes was in a good part of the city that looked almost Dutch in build and layout. There was Ducati garage just around the corner and a supermarket nearby that was as good as having a Marks and Spencer on your doorstep. It really was that good. Andy spent the afternoon at the Ducati garage trying to sort out his brakes, I carried out some running repairs and stripped off some plastic to see if I could straighten the front sub-frame with an inquisitive hotel security guard for company. Max and Jacqui went touristing. In the evening we went to Zona Rosa, it came well recommended and we weren't disappointed. Pavement cafes, bars, restaurants and party buses. A very lively place, ringing with life and full of people having a good time. Not at all like the Colombia we expected.



We ate in a big 'themed' restaurant with swing chairs and lots of candles. The waiter had to lend us a torch to read the menu!

# **Wootton Bassett Afghan Heroes ride is Stunning Success**

More than 15,000 motorcyclists turned out on Sunday 14 March to show their support for the people of Wootton Bassett and honour those troops killed in Afghanistan.. The 10,000 riders and 5000 pillions raised over £150,000 for the Afghan Heroes charity in the process. Wootton Bassett Mayor Steve Bucknell said: "The vast majority of the people of the town fully support what the bikers are doing today. "Too many times the town has had to stand still in silence but today is all about noise and movement."

Laurence Phillips, from Afghan Heroes, said: "It's quite a staggering spectacle and an unbelievable show of support for the troops in Afghanistan and a mark of respect for the town of Wootton Bassett. "I would imagine it is the biggest bike ride of its kind." The bikers set off from Hullavington Airfield, Wilts, in waves of 500 along the A429, B4042, Callow Hill to White Hill Lane and the A3102 to Wootton Bassett.

The police, Ministry of Defence and local authorities joined forces to marshall the riders through the town and there were no reports of any problems.

And the Mirror says we're "annoying gas-guzzlers"! Mirror newspaper columnist Chris Hughes has caused fury with an online column calling the charity ride-out through Wootton Bassett 'annoying'. In the online piece, Hughes states: "Now we've seen it all - hundreds of bikers showing their "solidarity with frontline troops," by trundling their petrol guzzling and fume spewing steeds through Wootton Bassett." He goes on to say: "But I wonder if someone - just for a change - could set a trend by doing something they hate doing to raise money for good causes. And something that isn't so public and... well.... so annoying?"

# MOTORCYCLING IN THE PHILIPPINES

Part 7

We went back to Manzante for Christmas and the New Year. I was looking forward to relaxing and enjoying very pleasant weather in the Northern Philippines at this time of year. The temperature is just under 30 degrees and the humidity low. In addition Rich and Pip Upham, old biking mates from UK, were planning to visit us from Miri in Malaysia where Pip is teaching at the Shell School. My daughter Alexia flew out from UK to join us for Christmas as well. The whole family were there with the exception of my eldest stepdaughter Mary who runs a bar in Singapore.

The first job on arriving in Manzante was to get the Jeepny going. This was easier said than done. Finally, after replacing the rotor arm and charging the battery, Richard poured some petrol down the carburettor and reluctantly the engine came to life.

Our garden always seems to be full of small children of largely unknown origin who stare at me with fascination every time I walk out of the front door. This time there seemed to be more than usual and Zenia told me her brother Bong had returned from Cabugao with his family. He is a jobbing builder with five children and was trying to build a small house on some land nearby given to him by Zenia's mother Silveria.

The younger children were dirty and scruffy and it transpired Bong was leaving them in our garden when he went to work. His wife was working in the Middle East and apparently sent money home for the family, a very familiar story in the Philippines. Zenia asked me if I would help Bong buy some more breeze blocks to finish his house — so I did. Only later when I saw him returning from the local shop with a crate of beer and bottles of local gin did I realise why his house was progressing so slowly. For some people here booze is the only way they can deal with the poverty and uncertainty they suffer in their lives.

I had promised Pam a motorbike for Christmas and she wasn't going to let me forget it. We all trooped into Vigan in the Jeepny to look at what was available. In the end she chose a 125cc Kawasaki which was a semi step through design. She had only ridden scooters before and was a bit nervous to ride the bike back from Vigan to Manzante in traffic as she was not familiar with the gear change. Very kindly Rich volunteered to ride the bike home as he was missing his biking and in the Philippines you don't have to wear a crash helmet if you don't want to. We followed in the Jeepny.

Remember this is a society that is still dominated by the images of old fashioned Spanish Roman Catholicism. There are many pictures of the Virgin Mary and Jesus everywhere. Jesus is shown as a man of about 40 with a beard and long hair. I have to say the resemblance to Rich of these pictures was uncanny. Many people froze in the street and talked animatedly to their companions when Rich walked by. As Rich rode though Santa Domingo on Pam's red motorcycle someone started screaming and pointing at him shouting "It's Jesus, it's Jesus on a motorbike". The crowd response was amazing and even a bit frightening. Sensibly Rich just kept going still trying to light his cigarette. Well, God may ride a Harley Davidson but in the Philippines Jesus rides a Kawasaki. Ask anyone in Santa Domingo.

Mobile phones must have been ringing because when we arrived home our housekeeper Donato couldn't wait to tell us that she had heard that Jesus had appeared in Santa Domingo. Rich didn't want to get a haircut or shave so I braced myself for hoards of handicapped people turning up at our front gate for a Lourdes type experience.

This time in Manzante I felt more connected to the rest of the world following our decision to get satellite TV. Samsung have a satellite over the Pacific Ocean which has all the usual channels such as Discovery, BBC World and National Geographic. Reception was so good I regretted not having taken the decision earlier.

My stepson Richard bought himself a very cheap Italian scooter over on Puro Island. It was in a poor state and despite rebuilding it he could not get if to run for more that a few seconds. In the end he cut the end off the silencer to reveal an old bee's nest completely blocking it. After that and a new silencer the scooter ran really well.

Whilst we were in Manzante the Epong Festival took place in which tens of millions of tiny fish swim into the mouth of the Banuang River. It only happens in this one place in the Philippines and the fishermen have a field day. We bought a couple of kilos and Zenia cooked them in hot olive oil. They were absolutely delicious which, I must admit, is a phrase I rarely use about Philippines food.

Four weeks went by very quickly and soon it was time to return to Dubai and put another episode of carefree existence behind us.
